I love having music lessons each week.








#### Class spotlight - Elm

#### Is my child too ill for school?

There are government guidelines for schools and nurseries about managing specific infectious diseases at GOV.UK. These say when children should be kept off school and when they shouldn't.

If you do keep your child at home, it's important to phone the school or nursery on the first day. Let them know that your child won't be in and give them the reason.

If your child is well enough to go to school but has an infection that could be passed on, such as a cold sore or head lice, let their teacher know.

Follow this advice for illnesses:

**Coughs and colds** It's fine to send your child to school with a minor cough or common cold. But if they have a fever, keep them off school until the fever goes. Encourage your child to throw away any used tissues and to wash their hands regularly.

**High temperature** If your child has a high temperature, keep them off school until it goes away.

**Chickenpox** If your child has chickenpox, keep them off school until all the spots have crusted over. This is usually about 5 days after the spots first appeared.

**Head lice and nits** There's no need to keep your child off school if they have head lice. You can treat head lice and nits without seeing a GP.

**Sore throat** You can still send your child to school if they have a sore throat. But if they also have a high temperature, they should stay at home until it goes away. A sore throat and a high temperature can be symptoms of tonsillitis.

**Vomiting and diarrhoea** Children with diarrhoea or vomiting should stay away from school until they have not been sick or had diarrhoea for atleast 2 days (48 hours).

The Warwick Rotary Club organises events such as the Warwick Thai Festival, the Warwick Castle carols



Budbrooke showed great resilience and skill to battle back from 4-0 down to make it 5-5, but a late goal earned the win for Claverdon in a match that could have gone either way.

Budbrooke started brightly with Henry setting up Finley for a series of strong shots that just narrowly missed and also a shot that hit the post.

Eli and Edward marshalled the defence well but Claverdon then grew in confidence and took the lead with a deflected shot. Jack made many great saves especially when he tipped a shot over the bar and also when he saved a powerful shot onto the bar. In a bizarre 5 minutes Claverdon scored 3 more.

Despite being 4-0 down, Budbrooke were not giving up. They played with great heart and after some mazy, skilful runs, Henry scored the first with a powerful curling effort. This lead to Budbrooke having lots of shots to get back into the game. Cameron was a driving force in midfield and Sonny looked to play in some nicely threaded through balls to create chances. Henry scored again to make it 4-2 to Claverdon at half time.

Claverdon brought on some strong substitutes and scored again early in the second half. Again, this ignited Budbrooke's passion. Jack, playing up front in this half, got behind the defence on many occasions and forced the goalkeeper into many good saves. Jack was finally rewarded when he scored a tap in after the goalkeeper palmed a save to in. Jack was again on hand to score another and Henry completed his hat-trick when he lashed in an unstoppable shot to complete an amazing comeback.

The match could have gone either way. Teddy, now in goal, saved brilliantly with his legs and the Claverdon goalkeeper kept on making wonder saves when a Budbrooke goal looked a certainty until a corner for Claverdon saw the ball deflect in off the midfielder's chest.
