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Class Spotlight- Holly

This week in Holly class we have enjoyed starting our new topic in maths. We have been arranging arrays to make equal groups and have challenged ourselves questioning what is the same and what is different about the groups.

We have also been writing an adventure story based on "Stig of the Dump" and we have used lots of adjectives, subordinating conjunctions and expanded noun phrases in our writing to make it more interesting!

Last Friday was a particularly exciting day for Holly class. The children took part in a cooking activity to support their learning for our current DT topic 'Cook Well, Eat Well!'. We discussed hygiene rules associated with food preparation, including washing hands, washing vegetables and maintaining a clean workspace. We learnt different techniques for chopping, slicing and dicing. We also evaluated our work at the end of the day and were very pleased with our beef and chicken tacos! We discussed the different flavours and how the fillings contribute to a healthy, balanced diet.





An online safety message from Digital Leaders

This week the Digital leaders have discussed and decided that our Online Safety focus this week will be Reliability.

Every time you use the internet you must ask yourself 'is this website that I'm using reliable?'. This can often be a hard question because even websites like Wikipedia, that can be used by many, does not always provide the true information. So what websites are reliable? Well, the Digital Leaders recommend the BBC website as it is always a useful and we know that it is telling the truth. So when you are next on the computer ask yourself: is the website that I'm using reliable?



Is my child too ill for school?

There are government guidelines for schools and nurseries about managing specific infectious diseases at GOV.UK. These say when children should be kept off school and when they shouldn't. If you do keep your child at home, it's important to phone the school every day. If your child is well enough to go to school but has an infection that could be passed on, let their teacher know.

Follow this advice for illnesses:

Coughs and colds- It's fine to send your child to school with a cough or cold. But if they have a fever, keep them off school until the fever goes. Encourage your child to throw away used tissues and to wash their hands regularly.

High temperature-If your child has a high temperature, keep them off school until it goes away.

Chickenpox -If your child has chickenpox, keep them off school until all the spots have crusted over.

Head lice and nits- There's no need to keep your child off school if they have head lice. You can treat head lice at home.

Sore throat—You can send your child to school if they have a sore throat. But if they also have a high temperature, they should stay at home until it goes away. A sore throat and a high temperature can be symptoms of tonsillitis.

Vomiting and diarrhoea- Children with diarrhoea or vomiting should stay away from school until they have not been sick or had diarrhoea for atleast 2 days (48 hours).

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Budbrooke Cross Country - Priors Field

Budbrooke runners had a very muddy experience at the first cross country race of the season.

The Primary Schools cross country league event, which was organised by Learnington Athletics Academy, took place at Priors Field school and included teams from 25 schools.

Heavy rainfall the night before had made the course muddy and presented potential tricky cross country conditions for all the runners, especially with the brook being waist deep for some. Running shoes needed to be tied tightly or risked being lost in the mud!

The 1.6km route took the runners around the school fields, along a road, around farmers fields before leading through a stream into the home straight to the finish line.

The Year 5 girls raced first and they supported each other to get around the course with a particularly strong finish from Lola who found some energy to sprint home in 55th place. Hattie ran at a constant pace to finish 56th.

Then the boys had to attack the course which had been made muddier and slippier by the girls. In what a very fast paced race, Jack and Sonny showed great determination and commitment to overcome the muddy obstacles and powered to fabulous 26th and 14th place finishes in their first cross country race.

The Year 6 girls can be very proud of their efforts as they both finished in the top 50. Ella (44th) had the stamina to overtake other runners in the home straight and Amelie (48th) showed character and resilience to ensure she finished strongly when legs were aching.

The last race of the event was the Year 6 boys' race. It was a very fast start and the pace kept up around the first field. The course by now was a mud bath and Henry and Robbie did immensely well to not slip round the first bend with other runners falling. Henry looked determined as he emerged confidently from the brook. He picked up the pace before crossing the line in an impressive 10th place. Robbie found energy as he came to close to the finish line overtaking others to finish in 82nd place.

Mr Brereton said: "Well done to all the runners to overcome the very muddy conditions. It was fantastic to see the commitment of Team Budbrooke, some had played in football matched before running the race or went to play football matches after the race. Others had arrived early and supported all the runners. This shows their enthusiasm for running and representing the school and they created a great team spirit. They all supported each other and cheered each other on. They persevered despite difficult slippery conditions and can all be proud of their efforts. It was great to see them run through the brook completing the race. Thank you to all the parents for their support and to Leamington Athletics Academy for organising the event."

The next cross country league race is at Myton Fields, Warwick on Saturday, 27th January 2024..







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Hockey Festival

Budbrooke showed great resilience and team spirit as they competed in a hockey festival at St Nicholas' Park.

Teams from 4 local primary schools took part in warm up activities organised by the young sports leaders from Kingsley.

In the first game, Budbrooke came up against a well organised Ferncombe team. Impressive defending from Alex and Nicole deflected shots onto the post. Budbrooke were defending resolutely but a break away attack saw Ferncombe score their winning goal.

Next up was a match against Shrubland Street. This time, Budbrooke showed plenty of attacking spirit with good dribbling from Robbie and Rupert. They attacked well with good skill from James, and Caitlyn creating chances but Budbrooke just could not get the ball over the line. Then with the final whistle approaching Shrubland Street scored despite the best efforts of Romy who tried to clear the ball off the line.

In the third game against Bishops Tachbrook, Budbrooke lost 2-0 but they then saved the best for the final match, a replay against Shrubland Street. Lois made some confident tackles and passes, Ella won the ball back well and James was full of running. James picked the ball up on the right hand side by the half way line and then proceeded to dribble the ball confidently into the area before scoring with a well placed shot into the corner. Nicole and Caitlyn came close to adding a second for Budbrooke but the ball was saved well. Towards the end of the match, Shrubland Street made a break away and equalised despite an amazing effort from Alex and Rupert to tackle and clear the ball off the line. The score finished 1-1

Lucas worked hard to win the ball back and after a great save from the goalkeeper, the ball fell kindly for Henry to finish off from close range and top off what was a fantastic team performance.
